






#### Single Crochet (sc)




#### Half Double Crochet (hdc)

pull up a loop, yarn over again, and pull through all three loops on the hook.




#### **Double Crochet (dc)**

Double crochet is a versatile stitch that creates a more open and airy fabric compared to single





**Treble Crochet (tr)** 





#### Chain Stitch (ch)
