Creating Your Granny Square with Round Center

Abbreviations:

Beg = Beginning Ch = Chain Dc = Double crochet Rep = Repeat Rnd(s) = Round(s) Sc = Single crochet SI st = Slip stitch Sp(s) = Space(s)St(s) = Stitch(es)



Instructions:

Note: The initial Ch 2 at the beginning of each round counts as a double crochet (dc).

Round 1: To begin, create a magic ring, then Ch 2. Next, work 11 dc stitches into the ring. Gently pull the ring tight, slip stitch to join to the 2nd chain stitch, and finish off.

Round 2: Join your yarn. Ch 2, then work 1 dc and 1 ch. In the same stitch, repeat (2 dc, 1 ch) 11 times. Slip stitch to join to the 2nd chain stitch from the foundation loop, and finish off.




Round 3: Chain 3 (counts as your first double crochet), work 2 double crochets in the chain-2 space from the previous round. Chain 2, work 3 double crochets in the next chain-2 space. Repeat from * to * around, ending with a chain 2. Slip stitch to the top of the beginning chain 3 to join.





Round 4: Join your yarn. Ch 2, and start with a corner (2 dc in the same space, 3 ch, 3 dc). *Then, chain 1 and work 3 hdc stitches in the next space. Repeat from * once more, chain 1, and work another corner (3 dc, 3 ch, 3 dc). Repeat from * two more times. Finally, chain 1, work 3 hdc stitches in the next space, repeat from ** once more, chain 1, and slip stitch to join to the 2nd chain stitch you initially crocheted at the beginning of the round.





Round 5: Move your crochet hook with 2 slip stitches to position it adjacent to the space formed by the nearest set of chain stitches in the corner. Ch 2 and create a corner (2 dc in the space, 2 ch, 3 dc) in the same space. *Chain 1, then work 3 dc stitches in the next space. Repeat from * two more times. Chain 1, create another corner (3 dc, 2 ch, 3 dc) in the next corner space. Repeat from * two more times. Lastly, chain 1, work 3 dc stitches in the next space, repeat from ** two more times, chain 1, and slip stitch to join to the 2nd chain stitch you crocheted at the beginning of the round. Finish off.





Round 6: Join your yarn in a corner space. Ch 2 and create a corner (2 dc in the space, 2 ch, 3 dc) in the same space. *Chain 1, work 3 dc stitches in the next space. Repeat from * three more times. Chain 1, create another corner (3 dc, 2 ch, 3 dc) in the next corner space. Repeat from * two more times. Lastly, chain 1, work 3 dc stitches in the next space, repeat from ** three more times, chain 1, and slip stitch to join to the 2nd chain stitch you initially crocheted at the beginning of the round. Finish off.
